LIGHTNING INTENSITY, FREQUENCY IMPACTS ELECTRIC GRID

Weather Pattern Changes

Recent summer storms have demonstrated the enormous power that can impact our lives and property in minutes. Strong winds, rainfall, and lightning have all combined to wreak havoc on many people and their property in the region.

Cass County Electric Cooperative Inc. (CCEC) started monitoring lightning strikes in our service area beginning in June 2009 and has noted a tremendous increase in activity this year. The table below shows the number of lightning strikes documented for the past three summers.

Greg Gust of the National Weather Service (NWS) told CCEC the dramatic increase in lightning activity can be attributed primarily to increases in the frequency of the severe weather, and the size or footprints of the storms. The 2011 storms seem to cover much larger geographic areas, thus allowing for more intense and frequent lightning strikes.

Lightning & Electric Utilities

Lightning strikes can be very damaging to electric utility equipment. The amount of energy passed on in a lightning strike is difficult to determine. Severe lightning storms can often cause a blink in electric service if not an outage. It's difficult to fully

realize the large amount of energy in a lightning strike, but the result is often seen in blown up poles, burned wire, and even exploded devices. Underground utility equipment is not immune from lightning damage. In fact, lightning seems to cause more permanent damage to underground cables vs. overhead lines. This often includes the very devices that utilities install to protect their systems from lightning. On the night of August 1, CCEC lost crucial equipment due to a lightning strike.

Electric utilities use various types of protection devices on their lines to protect against lightning strikes. Commonly called 'arresters', these devices do a good job of protecting the utility equipment and most times can even prevent many of the momentary blinks from occurring. However, in the severest of storms or if these devices have already been destroyed in the storm, repeated lightning strikes will result in momentary system blinks.

The transmission grid is a complex and highly interconnected system of power lines. When the grid experiences a problem or failure, sometimes resulting from a lightning strike, the impact can be seen hundreds and even thousands of miles away. For the local transmission system, this means that



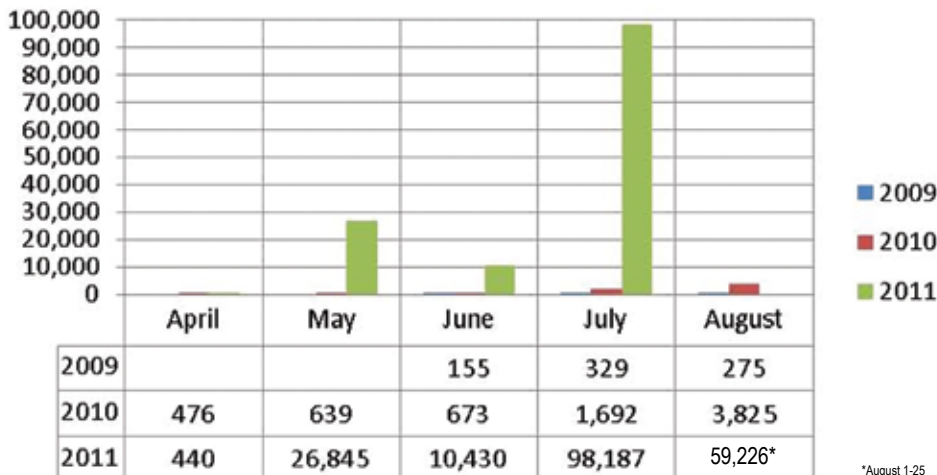
the weather can be clear in one area, yet the entire system can be blinked due to a lightning strike far away in another part of the system. This was the case on the night of August 1. A storm passed through Cass County, causing the entire transmission system to blink. The momentary blink was experienced well into the Ransom County area.

Sensitive electronics in homes can be subject to damage from repeated blinks in electric service. This can be prevented most easily by unplugging them during a storm. However that's not always very practical or even possible to do.

Home and business owners are always urged to install their own overvoltage protection to guard against momentary blinks. These items are available, and vary in ability and capacity from simple plug-in power strips with built-in protection, to whole-house systems that require an electrician to install. For the most critical of systems, such as computers, an uninterruptible power supply (UPS) is recommended. All sensitive electronics should be protected with some form of overvoltage protection.

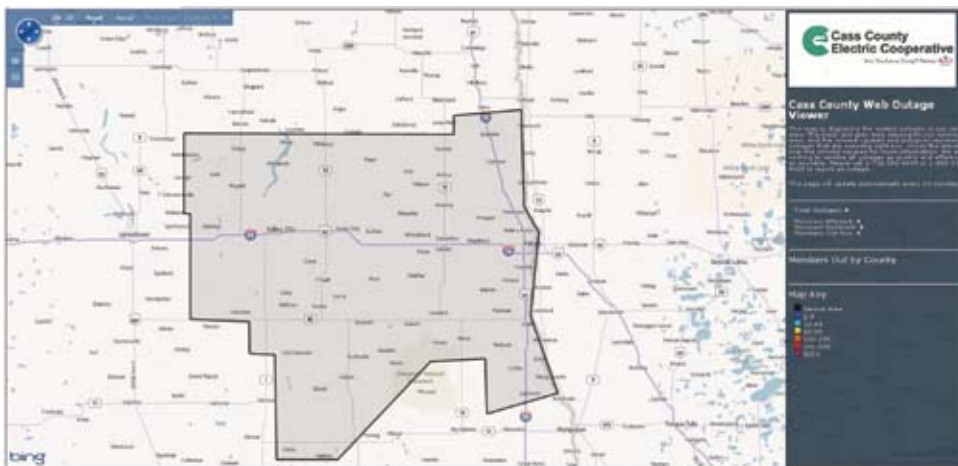

Director Districts Redrawn

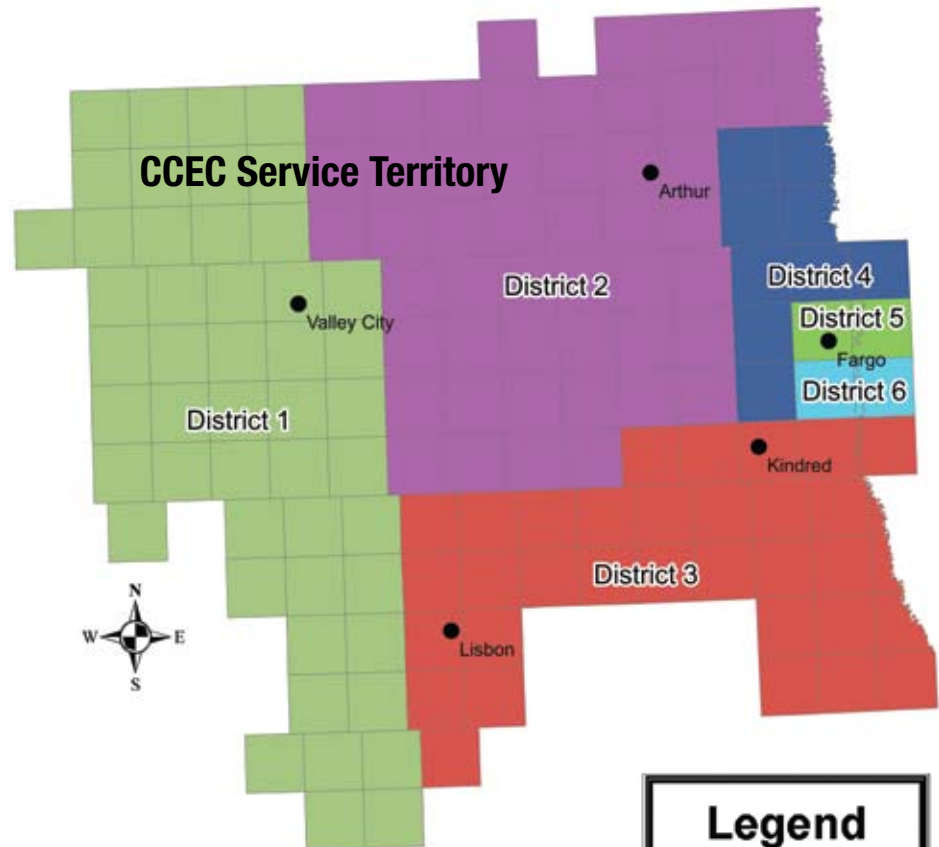
Effective 01/01/2012






At its July 2011 meeting, the Cass County Electric Cooperative's board of directors acted to redraw the cooperative's director district boundaries and establish changes in director representation. Director district boundaries have been unchanged since 1997. Since that time CCEC member demographics have changed considerably. Two incumbent directors have announced plans to not seek reelection in future years, making this an appropriate time to reconsider district boundaries.

Effective January 1, 2012, there will be six director districts as compared with the current eight. A transition plan is in place which will have two directors from new district 1 (see new district map) and two directors from new district 3. One of the directors from new district 1 will not be seeking reelection in 2012. The director position eliminated from new district 1 will be filled by an "at-large" director who will be elected at the 2012 annual meeting. Any member who is a bona fide resident of the cooperative's entire service area and meets the other director qualifications described in the bylaws is eligible to run for the at-large position. In order to preserve the standard director election rotation, the 2012 election will be for a two-year term. All successive terms for the at-large position will be three year terms.

Additionally, one of the directors from new district 3 will not be seeking reelection in 2013. The director position eliminated from new district 3 will be filled with a director elected from district 5 at the 2013 annual meeting. At that time, district 5, which is the cooperative's most populous district, will have three directors. Beginning in 2013, one district 5 director position will be up for election or reelection every year.

The board adopted several amendments to Article III of its bylaws to accommodate the changes to the director districts. Among the amendments were provisions which (i) remove the requirement

that all directors be assigned to a director district; (ii) allow the board to establish director seats to be filled by any individual member or spouse of a member who is a bona fide resident of any part of the cooperative's service area; (iii) grant the board the right to establish transitional provisions allowing changes in director districts to be made without adding to or omitting any director's existing term of office; and (iv) authorize any member to sign a petition nominating a director seeking election to a seat not associated with a director district. Shedding **light** on new Standards

There is a common misconception out there when it comes to the new lighting standards that are to begin in 2012. The new standards, established by the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007, say that light bulbs, including incandescent bulbs, need to use 25% less energy by 2014. As of January 1, 2012, traditional, inefficient 100W incandescent light bulbs will not meet the standards and will no longer be available at most stores. However, you will have many other options that will save you money. Many of these choices are already on store shelves.

Similar standards will phase in for other types of light bulbs over the next three years. Traditional 75-watt incandescent light bulbs will no longer be available as of January 1, 2013. Traditional 40 and 60-watt incandescent light bulbs will no longer be available as of January 1, 2014.

The misconception? Many people believe that incandescent bulbs are being phased out all together.

The new lighting standards

What many people don't realize is that these energy-saving light bulbs (including incandescent, CFLs, and LEDs) are available today and could save consumers about \$50 per year when they replace 15 traditional incandescent bulbs in their home.

"Up to 12 percent of a typical monthly electric bill pays for lighting, so removing energy-wasting bulbs from the market will have a big impact on America's energy use," explains Erik Sorenson, a project manager with the National Electrical Manufacturers Association (NEMA), which represents companies that

make products used in the generation, transmission, distribution, control, and end use of electricity.

Retooled incandescent bulbs contain a small capsule of halogen gas that surrounds the filament, which increases efficiency and improves longevity, while retaining the shape, color choices, and dimming capabilities that consumers have favored in incandescent bulbs.

Under the federal Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007, light bulbs must be 28 percent more efficient than traditional incandescent bulbs (which use 90 of their energy producing heat) starting in 2012, and by 2020, they must be 70 percent more efficient. NEMA estimates the new standards could save Americans up to \$15.8 billion per year.

Other options

The new generation incandescent bulbs will join compact fluorescent lightbulbs (CFLs) and light-emitting diodes (LEDs) as energy-efficient lighting options. CFLs and LEDs both are about 75 percent more efficient than traditional incandescents. CFLs last about 10 times longer; LEDs about 25 times longer. But CFLs are the more economical choice at the moment. The cost of LEDs is expected to come down as the technology advances.

"With lighting legislation mandating more efficient technologies and consumers looking for every opportunity to save, navigating lighting solutions has never been so important," emphasizes David Schuellerman, GE Lighting's public relations manager.

Understanding the measurement of light

The usage measurement on the packaging of lighting will also be changing. To help consumers better understand the switch from watts to lumens, the Federal Trade Commission will require a new product label for light bulbs in the coming months. It will help people buy the light bulbs that are right for them.

Like the helpful nutrition label on food products, the Lighting Facts label will help consumers understand what they are really purchasing. The label clearly provides the lumens—or brightness—of the bulb, the estimated operating cost for the year, and the color of the light (from warm/yellowish, to white to cool/blue).

"Lumens are to light what pounds are to bananas and gallons are to milk," the site says. "Lumens let you buy the amount of light you want. So when buying your new bulbs, think lumens, not watts."

The brightness, or lumen levels, of the lights in your home may vary widely, so here's a rule of thumb:

- To replace a 100-watt incandescent bulb, look for a bulb that gives you about 1600 lumens. If you want something dimmer, go for less lumens; if you prefer brighter light, look for more lumens.
- Replace a 75-watt bulb with an energy-saving bulb that gives you about 1100 lumens
- Replace a 60-watt bulb with an energy-saving bulb that gives you about 800 lumens
- Replace a 40-watt bulb with an energy-saving bulb that gives you about 450 lumens.

A study by Colorado-based E Source shows that more than 81 percent of households in the US have at least one compact fluorescent light bulb. Market penetration is highest in Alaska and California, where about 87 percent of households already are using CFLs, and nearly half have at least six bulbs in use. CFLs account for about 28 percent of residential bulb sales. Michael Shepard, E Source president, said that lighting accounts for nearly 20 percent of the nation's electricity use, and the potential for savings is immense.

Sausage & Potato Soup

Ingredients:

- 1 lb pork sausage
- 3-4 strips bacon, cut up
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 10 c. water
- 7 chicken bouillon cubes
- 3 large russet potatoes,
(washed & cubed - bite sized pieces)
- 1 pint half & half
- 1 cup kale, chopped (optional)
- Salt & pepper
- Parmesan cheese

Directions:

In a large soup kettle, brown the pork sausage then remove from pan. Set aside.

In the same kettle, fry the bacon, onion and garlic and cook until bacon is done and the onion is translucent, about 4 minutes.

Add the 10 cups of water and the 7 bouillon cubes, bring to a boil.

Add the potatoes and cook until the potatoes are just done, about 3-4 minutes.

Reduce heat to low and add the half and half, kale and sausage, heat through.

*Serve with Parmesan cheese and crusty bread.

*To make it a little spicier, I use 1 lb of "hot" pork sausage and add 2 tsp. of cayenne pepper to the onions and bacon.

Shortcut Chicken Manicotti

Ingredients:

- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 4 oz Velveeta cheese product, cut up in small pieces
- 2 cups broccoli (fresh or frozen)
- 12 manicotti pasta shells, uncooked
- 1 lb boneless chicken breasts cut into strips
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

Directions:

Mix soup, water & cheese in microwaveable bowl.

Microwave on high 3 min or until cheese is melted.

Pour one third of the soup mixture onto the bottom of 13x9 baking dish. Set aside.

Add 2 cups broccoli (fresh or frozen) or your favorite vegetable to the remaining soup mixture.

Stuff pasta with chicken strips, place in baking dish.

Cover completely with remaining soup mixture

Sprinkle with 1/4 cup parmesan cheese.

Cover with foil.

Preheat oven 400 degrees.

Bake 45-50 minutes or until pasta and chicken is cooked through.
